

THE IMPORTANCE OF GOOD ATTENDANCE



80% would be an excellent exam result, but it's very low as an attendance rate, as it means your child is missing 20% of their education. This equates to one day per week.

80% over 6 years at primary school equates to 1 year and 38 days of missed education (i.e. missing 1/6)

Lateness

There will be the rare occasion when the car won't start or the washing machine floods the kitchen. However, it's really important that a child is in school to start the day on time.

We can all relate to how we feel when we are running late. Stress levels start to rise and it can impact on the morning ahead.

Being late makes your child feel different. We notice that children often have difficulty entering a class last, when others are already learning. Lots of classes have important reading, phonics and spelling lessons first thing in the morning. Missing these affects children's development as readers and writers. This impacts on their learning across all of the areas of the curriculum.

Holidays

Please do not take your child out of school during term time for a holiday or any other reason, such as weddings, funerals, or visiting relatives, without first requesting authorisation of the Headteacher.

We publish our term dates in advance to enable families to plan where they can. Any absence will result in your child missing out on education. You may think they can catch up easily, but if they miss an important building block, it is so much harder to keep up. Holidays in term time may incur a penalty notice of £60 per parent per child, if paid within 21 days, rising to £120 per parent per child, if paid within 28 days. Any savings you make on the price of the holiday will be less than you think.


Illness

All children get ill and the school does NOT want you to send your child into school if they are genuinely ill.

Where possible, try not to round up any absence due to illness. If your child feels ill in the morning but rallies by lunchtime, send them in for the afternoon session. Similarly, if they are ill on Monday, but feel better by Thursday, send them in for the Friday. It's surprising how quickly the absences mount up, until your child is suddenly classed as being "persistently absent" Persistent absence is when a child has attendance below 90%.
